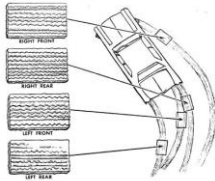


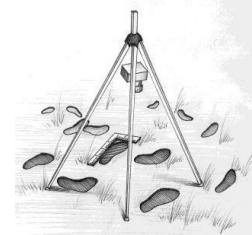

**Target Audience:** This course is designed for those individuals with the responsibility for the documentation, collection and preservation of evidence. This course is also designed for those wishing to begin a career in footwear and tire track impression evidence.

**Course Description:** This training course is designed to present a series of interactive lectures using PowerPoint and various hands on exercise. This course is specifically designed for crime scene investigators and others involved in the collection and preservation of physical evidence at a crime scene. This course focuses on learning techniques that will allow your agency to greatly improve the documentation, collection and preservation of this critical type of evidence. An effort is made to present the material in a clear, understandable manner using lectures, open dialogs, a little bit of humor and lots of "Hands On" exercises that are all designed to instill confidence at the next crime scene. This course will provide the crime scene investigator with a solid understanding of the proper methods for collecting and preserving a variety of different types of footwear and tire track impressions that should be found at crime scenes.
